Gu <b>ă</b> n Zhòng	管仲	720-645 BC, Chinese philosopher and politician, also known as Guǎnzi (管子). He was a major reformer and served as Duke Huan's chancellor
Qí	齐国	Ancient Zhou-era state located in Shandong province that lasted from 1046 to 221 BC
Duke Huán	齐桓公	Ruler of the State of Qi from 685-643 BC. He transformed the state of Qi into the most powerful state.
Yān State	燕国	An ancient Chinese state during the Zhou Dynasty that lasted from the 11th century to 222 BC
Yān Mountains	燕山	The mountain range in Hebei that is located north of Beijing
Lìngzhī	令支国	A mountain state ruled by the Shanrong people in the Spring and Autumn Period.located In today's Hebei Province, Qian'an 迁安, Qianxi 迁西 and the northern part of Luan 滦 County.
Gūzhú	孤竹国	an important vassal state in the northeast of Hebei and the west of Liaoning during the Shang Dynasty. Its culture has an important connection with the Yin 殷 and Shang 商 culture
Tángshān	唐山	City in Hebei Province to the northeast of Tianjin
Héběi Province	河北省	Northern province in China
Bóh <b>ǎ</b> i Sea	渤海湾	The northwestern and innermost extension of the Yellow Sea. Liaoning and Hebei are located along the coast of the Bohai Sea

Shānróng	山戎族	The Rong were a collection of tribes that lived in Northern China during the Spring and Autumn period. The Shanrong were considered a branch of Northern Rong.
Shāng Dynasty	商朝	Ancient Chinese dynasty that lasted approximately from 1600 to 1046 BC
Huáng Huā	黄花	A Guzhu spy who was sent to the Qi army camp to lay a trap for them and trick them into getting lost in the mountains
